Having been involved with the sport for over twenty five years it has become clear to me that we are certainly developing as a broomball nation in leaps and bounds. Clearly the skills and team ethics have improved as has the dedication and commitment to the sport. AS the national president I am thrilled to note that here in South Australia serious moves are well under way to gain an advantage over the east coast adversary. The move to training for Nationals in the past few years is a positive Broomball Australia whole heartedly endorses and not for the most obvious reasons. The knock on effect of fitter well drilled teams at our premier events will not only be a benefit to the individuals who take the time and make the effort to play but will go a long way to promoting the sport as a serious, healthy sport to all those thinking of giving it a go.

I can attest to the fact that not so many years ago the SA team would consist of maybe five persons who traveled needing to pick up 'anybody' just to play. Now we see that all our member associations take the sending of teams as a serious business with a view to winning and not just making up the numbers. There have been many other vast improvements over the years which include looking at tactics and the sport science side of the game along with rest and recovery to benefit all that play.

Officiating has also come a long way and with more time this too will go even further to the point where we can see semi professional referees turning up at major tournaments coming out of the grass roots programs we are currently facilitating.

All Associations are working through the complex issues they face including how to increase numbers as well as ice time. Broomball Australia is also looking at this as an issue but from the more political viewpoint of the federal level.

It is necessary to have government recognition and most importantly the right recognition as this assists with securing grants and means to overcome issues.

2010 is a big year for Broomball as we face the exciting trip to Europe for the next Worlds. This year we convene in Innsbruck to celebrate the 2010 World Broomball Championships. The team from Australia looks like it will be the largest we have taken off shore which clearly shows the sport is reaching out to all and offers a level in the game we just cannot replicate here yet.

I urge all to seriously consider this trip as it will be well worth the time money and effort.

I have already alluded to the fact we are looking to secure the right recognition and that is a major issue for Broomball Australia. Other programs we are working with are the update of the current rule set as well as a series of policies that firstly need to be in place at the peak level but more importantly will be able to be utilised by member associations for their operations which will include when submitting for grants or funding.
